The surface of the once-black TC was freckled with stone chips gathered over decades; marks of past journeys, each chip, dent and scrape belonging on the vintage car; art to be admired. One dent on my MGF's perfect panel is damage; nothing to be admired. Nothing beautiful about it. A friend swung open the door and my heart sunk as I heard the door strike the timber post; a painful, dull squelch. Don't look now, keep smiling, keep smiling. The dent, a vertical crease, disrupted the fluidity of the curved surface. It didn't belong. On those first days I wore out the garage door hinges coming in at every opportunity, having another look; looking at it from various angles, in different light, running fingertips over it. We have a delightful automobile story to tell you. In 1953, in Fredericton, N.B. while attending the University of New Brunswick as a forestry student, I bought a second-hand 1951MG TD sportster.

It eventually became my means to make my move permanently to B.C. in February of 1956. Prior to that, I had experienced three summers in B.C. as a forestry student, and could not resist the draw of the province with its mountain beauty and magnificent forests. My trip from New Brunswick in 1956 was an amazing challenge in itself. That year

was probably one of the worst for blizzards from coast to coast in a long time. There were major storms in Northern Ontario, Manitoba, Montana – and in Spokane, Wash. I found that all the American passes to the coast were closed due to snowfall. I managed to get through the Hope-Princeton, but through an 80-mile blizzard, with carved snow banks on all sides.



But now- for the good part! In Vancouver, in 1958, my wife to be, Isobel, and I courted in, were married in, and honeymooned in this lovely little car. Some of our wedding "friends" (?) loaded our heater with Limburger cheese...much



to the delight of several Cariboo mouse populations. We followed the gold rush trail, in that MG, from Lillooet to Wells-Barkerville – camping out, mostly, but also being hosted by a marvellous Mrs. Place at her Dog Creek Ranch (32 rooms, plus original A.Y. Jacksons on her walls). And, at Barkerville, meeting Ches Lyons of B.C. Parks fame, and discussion the future plans for that historical park.



Soon, we produced three of our children – and up to that number, still managed to go camping in that little MG (camping gear, sleeping bags, a crib, etc.). But when the fourth came along – that was it. So, the MG went into storage, and the first of three Volkswagen vans became our practical means of transport, to allow now for four children and two wire-haired terriers on frequent trips to our cabin at Whistler.



The MG remained in storage for about 30 years – but Isobel, a long-time artist, saved her money for 20 years and we had the MG professionally restored in 2001 by Octagon Motors, in Vancouver – just in time for it to be part of the 2001 Canada Day parade in Whistler – an appropriate bright red, at that. 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SU Know How



We hear it so often, 'my MG is hard to start when it's cold', it coughs and splutters as the starter cranks the engine. It just goes on and on, and finally you have success. If your classic is fitted with a manual choke cable SU Carburettor set, its operation may well be your problem.

I recently read a great tip to help start your manual SU choke cable classic from cold start. When you pull the choke cable out, you think the choke is engaged. Try pulling it further. Even maintaining the pulling tension as you turn the key. It's this last pull that engages the choke jet and pulls the jet down to allow a greater flow of fuel. When you pull the cable, the bulk of the choke cable length, opens the carburettor throttle to allow more air (not fuel) to enter and increase revs.

If your carburettor or carburettors had had years of use, it may need a partial rebuild. You can purchase a partial rebuild kit of parts. They include new gaskets, (as slow petrol leaks may have appeared), needles and jets. There are many excellent SU "how to repair" books available. After all, the SU carburettor has been around since 1905 and fitted to millions of cars worldwide.



Where to buy original SU parts is the next hurdle. There is a reliable supplier in Sydney, supplying SU Parts and complete systems. Bill Bressington, the founder of MIDEL, was the driving force behind SU in Australia. He served his apprenticeship from 1945 at the then, SU distributors, York Motors. In 1970 Bill set up Partoco Trading which evolved into MIDEL P/L. In 1984 the company saw rapid expansion and moved into their existing premises and modern warehouse facility. Bill's yearly visits to SU England since 1960, has put MIDEL at the forefront on product

knowledge and range. As parts have diminished, MIDEL also manufacture its own SU carburettors parts. Their web site **www.sumidel.com** is a **great resource for spares and they provide excellent phone advice on Sydney 02-9759 5598.** They provide overnight freight service, and I confirm their excellent customer service and knowledge. My only connection with MIDEL is that of a customer.

I recently finished replacing the needles, jets, cork gaskets and other gaskets purchased from MIDEL for the H4 twin SU carburettors on my MGA 1600. The series of photos here show spare parts I purchased and the various stages of dismantling my SU carbs. Most importantly, the cork gaskets, need soaking overnight in oil before fitment, to ensure correct fitment. See Photo right:

Knowing that choke-cabled SU carburettors have generally only 2 moving parts in the main body, is a great comfort if you are considering a DIY project. The jet moves down when the choke is applied, and the piston lifts the tapered needle to allow more fuel to flow. It's really a simple carburettor and well worth your consideration for a DIY service.

A pair of jump leads walks into a bar. The barman says, "I'll serve you, but don't start anything."


Somebody complimented me on my parking today. They left a note on the windscreen -- it said, 'Parking Fine'.

Collector's Corner

Throughout the 1990s 'Drive' journalists persisted with unsubstantiated criticism of the MGF, so in a letter to the editor I responded: "..the paint scratches easily', what next, that MG has been misspelt on the badge?"





Well, thank goodness MG Rover got the MG logo correct because in 1972, BMC Australia didn't. In a theatrical protest before national press, BMC farewelled the last Australian-assembled MGB with a staged funeral and a headstone bearing a hexagon MG logo. Heads should have rolled and the headstone put to use. Trademarks are valuable intellectual property.



Currently selling on eBay is this blue (that's a first) hexagon MG pin. Is this an example of ignorance or an aftermarket manufacturer's ridiculous attempt to

evade patents with a 10% design difference?

In his book 'MG Collectables' (Bay View Books 1997), Michael Ellman-Brown featured this jewelled brooch.



The author asks: 'was this jeweller's licence, a deliberate mistake or just a coincidence?" I wouldn't accept a coincidence. The design of the letters 'MG' on both the pin and brooch is too similar to the letters in Ted Lee's 1923 MG logo. Need to be different or like a stir? The hexagon MG Pin is yours for \$25 but wear it at your peril.

The Perfect Finish



The black crackle finish, sometimes called 'wrinkle' or 'camera case' finish, is on MGB/C and Midget dashboards. It has a quiet elegance. The restrained, textured black sets off the chrome details and contributes an aviation appearance.

It's also a practical dashboard finish; giving off no reflections or shine and is unaffected by hot sun, unlike timber and

vinyl. The black crackle finish is also found on the housing of the MGB/C's automatic Borg Warner gear selector, the radio blanking plate, and the vent outlets.



Black crackle restoration is an easy diy with the paint available in aerosol cans. A common problem is inconsistent texture in cold temperatures. Don't use a hair dryer or a fan heater because the hot air quickly dries the paint to a smooth finish. To gain the perfect finish radiating heat is required. For small parts, a domestic oven is ideal. Pre-heat the oven and place the bare metal panel in the oven for one minute to warm the metal up. Remove the panel and whilst it's warm, spray an even coat of paint. Switch oven off, otherwise the paint will burn, and place the wet painted panel back into the hot oven. Keep the aerosol can away from heat. Watch the wrinkled texture emerge in less than a minute. For large parts such as the dash panel use a strip radiator heater in a confined container such

as a metal drum or bricked up corner. In Melbourne, I found 40-degree centigrade days made for the job. **Does Tasmania ever get that hot?**
