#### Look At Me!



This scissor sensation is the new MG. SAIC unveiled the MG at the Shanghai Motor Show in April and everyone is talking. Talk about the WOW factor. Those scissor doors, scooped nose, spoiler chin, long bonnet and contours bestow super car looks. Ostentatious? No. Sports cars are about engaging us with up to the minute styling and driving dynamics. The sports car market is a competitive niche and MG has a new generation of buyers to win over.

The stuff of dreams continues inside with infotainment tech screens, touch controls, push button gear changes and capsule seating. It's rumoured that the upmarket model will have a formula-one style yoke steering wheel and some expect it will be 'steer by wire'. Certainly not the time to ask about cup holders, foot rests and other namby- pamby inclusions. I look at my MGB cars, still so gorgeous, but now I know how long 60 years is. Technology has moved us onto a new playing field and much is unfamiliar.



Dimensions will pump the MG even more road presence; as it is longer and wider than MGF, MGB and MX5; upsized to Jaguar F Type dimensions. In the metal 4535 long and 1913mm wide.

The MG has got the looks but will it have the drive to match those looks? For now, all that's known is data extracted from the patents file. A 321kw motor will drive the rear wheels on the entry model. The upmarket model is all-wheel drive, with two motors, one up front, one rear giving a total of 400kw, which is claimed to be capable of 0 -100 kms in less than 4 seconds. But it's not only about speed. Can this heavy EV be the nibble, agile sports car that MGs are loved for? Can an EV provide the soundtrack feedback that's part and parcel of sports car enjoyment? A whirr or drone just wont cut it.

How long will the battery last before it needs replacing and at what cost? Remember the Finnish man who protested by having an explosives team blow up his Tesla; it required a \$23K battery replacement.

Currently, the new MG is referred to as MG Cyberster but there's talk of alternatives for markets outside China. SIAC has applied for patents to 'MGC EV' in Europe and 'IGE' in Switzerland. Some enthusiasts are hoping it will be known as 'MGE'. Worth a number plate gamble?

European sales begin mid-2024. Australia? A summer launch would be fitting.

Price? Everyone is guessing. Some hope it will be priced just above MX5's 50k and hope they may. EVs cost more. Others say it will be in Porsche Boxer \$100k bracket, arguing that SIAC probably intends the Cyberster to be a marketing hero to attract buyers to its more affordable cars. Many place the entry model, with the one motor, in the \$70k range. Another measuring stick may be the boutique EV 'RBW', an all-electric car built using MGB heritage shell and powered by Nissan Lithium -ion batteries, priced at £90k.

Shanghai has our attention and until it delivers, dream and wonder.

The focus for us was **the Motorkhana and Super Sprints** on the Sunday and Monday with the Bend Motor Sport Park provided first class facilities.



#### Tim's Humour for the month of April

All About Hand Tools

Hammer: Originally employed as a weapon of war. Now used as a kind of divining rod to locate expensive MG parts in the immediate vicinity of the object we are trying to hit.

Slip-Joint Combination Pliers: Used to round off bolt heads, crack nuts and make blood blisters on your fingers.

Wire wheel: Cleans rust off old bolts and propels them at the speed of light somewhere under the workbench. Also removes fingerprint whorls, skin on the knuckles and promotes visits to the eye doctor (see safety glasses).

Safety glasses: Protection for the eyes. Seldom used until after a visit to the doctor to remove metal fragments.

Bolt and stud extractor: An expensive, precision tool that snaps off in bolt holes. Ten times harder than any known drill bit.

Phillips screwdriver: Normally used as an alignment tool (note the unusual bends), a leather punch, a paint stirrer, or to stab the foil seal on a bottle of carb cleaner, power-steering fluid, brake fluid or other liquid, simultaneously squirting the contents on your new T-shirt. Also used for rounding off Phillips screw threads.

Straight-blade screwdriver: A device used to pry with, such as when opening a can. Will do an excellent job of slipping off screw heads and scratching paint, especially if the paint is new.

Sockets: Cylindrical chrome components that always roll just out of reach when you are lying under your MG, making you reach after it and hit your head on the gearbox. The size you are after will always be missing from the set.
