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Lean or Rich, Get it Just Right

SU Carburettors - fuel adjustment

Is your MG or classic car fitted with SU carburettors running rough, coughing, or spluttering? Is the exhaust pipe all black and smoke evident out of the exhaust pipe at idle or when travelling? You may have also noticed poor fuel consumption or overheating. How often have you thought it is too hard to set the fuel adjustment on your SU carburettors? There is a helping hand to ensure it is a task you can complete with ease.

Since the 1970's, Colortune has been the original and best tool for seeing what is happening inside your combustion chamber of a petrol engine. The 'see through spark plug' allows you to see and to adjust the mixture by colour. The tune up spark plug is designed for petrol/LPG 2 and 4 stroke engines with single or multiple carburettors or fuel injection systems.

Colortune spark plug should be fitted in a warm engine running at idle speed. A regular flash of light, either a yellow or blue colour shade should be visible as the fuel mixture is ignited in the cylinder. The colour could also be in between.





A yellow spark indicates a rich mixture of fuel, (just like when you light a gas hot plate on low). A blue coloured spark indicates the correct fuel air mixture to give your engine its best performance with fuel usage and economy. (Your gas hot plate is the same colour blue when turned up to high with the correct gas air mixture obtained).

The majority of MG's that are fitted with SU carburettors, have two carburettors. Each carburettor would normally service two cylinders with a fuel air mixture for combustion. All cylinders of the car should be tested with the Colortune spark plug to assess the fuel/air flow mixture for the correct

colour, and for adjustment if necessary. It is then a simple matter of adjusting the fuel mixture screw of the carburettor servicing that cylinder tested.

Remember the fuel adjustment screw on your SU carbs (see picture), is turned clockwise to make the fuel flow lean and anti-clockwise to increase the fuel flow.



Just google Colortune for the best retailer and price to start your fuel adjustment tuning.

It is so true, knowledge is power. There are many great SU Carb manuals on maintaining and tuning readily available. The 20th Edition of SU's 224-page spare parts and specification catalogue is an amazing read.

Our salute to George H Skinner who patented the SU carburettor in 1908, that's still available from The SU Carburettor Company LTD, England.

'SU Carburettors Tuning Tips and Techniques manual' (printed since 1968) recommends the Colortune to fuel adjustment, with the caution that other vitals are correct including: ignition timing, spark plug gap and condition, valve clearances and compression.

In the next technical article lets discuss the replacement of worn SU needles and jets to improve engine performance.

On The Classic Car Show, co-host, Jodie Kidd ridicules host Quentin Wilson's praise of the MGB by handing him slippers and a pipe. Put the slippers and pipe away, MG's performance brand: X Power is on track.

The **MG 4 X Power** to be in showrooms as you read. Performance brands have more bite than BMC's badge-engineering when trim and a second SU christened a new variant. Performance brands are

developed by specialist engineers, injunction with the car manufacturer. For the mass manufacturer, performance brands are great marketing as the image of superior power and technology flows on to the lesser cars of the marque. Performance brands include Abarth for Fiat-Chrysler, BMW's M, Holden had HSV, MINI JCW, Nissan Nismo, Jaguar/Land Rover SVO and Mercedes' AMG....nothing to do with MG; AMG stands for founders: Aufrechht and Melcher and their town, Grossaspach.

The MG 4 X Power is a dual-motored EV producing 320kW and 600Nm, with a claimed 0-100km/h time of 3.8 seconds. Remember when 7.8 was fast? Its 64kWh battery has a 385km range. X Power improvements over the standard MG 4 include recalibrated springs and dampers, stiffer anti-roll bars, sharper steering, 'Dynamic Cornering Control System', electronically-locking differential and 'Intelligent Motor Control' for torque transmission between all four wheels. The brakes are uprated to vented 345 discs on all wheels highlighted with orange callipers. Australian X Power cars have a lap timer! O heck, authorities wont like that. Trinkets include unique 18 inch alloy wheels, polished trim, Alcantara upholstery and unique paint colours. Faster than Porsche 911 for an affordable \$59,990 and it can do the school run.



Car Detailing Skateboards



Detailing stools allow you polish the lower area of the car in more comfort than sitting or kneeing on a concrete floor. You can easily manoeuvre around the car and some stools also provide height adjustment and storage for cleaning products. They vary in design and price, from \$80 to \$400. You can make your own. It can be as simple as four castors attached to a chipboard disc. It's an opportunity to savage broken desk chair. I made one (left photo) using a

child's tractor stool discarded at the tip. I glued and screwed a chipboard disc to the metal base. If you're short on time, use a moving dolly; at Bunnings they start at \$17. For safety; I recommend painting it a bright colour and hanging the stool when not in use so you don't accidently step on it and... polish yourself off.

Collector's Corner



Dartmouth Pottery (Devon UK) is best known for its 'Gurgle Fish Jug' which gave gurgling sounds as you poured. During the 1980s classic car boom, Dartmouth made ceramic classic cars.
